### **2018 Jubilee Year—A time of Rest, Refreshment, Renewal!**

Trinity's Jubilee Year is off to a great start. We are taking a 'time out' in 2018 from ceaseless activity and unproductive exertion. This year, we are focusing on what can be called the uniquely 'CHURCH' practices...the things that only churches do. Like reading the Bible...the whole Bible in one year! See the article below about the small groups who started reading in January and are meeting to talk about the experience.

Another uniquely 'CHURCH' practice is prayer. Each month this year we will have a Prayer of the Month which asks God to help us, as a Church, to grow more loving and more faithful. The January prayer was used in worship and committee meetings and Bible studies and hopefully, by people in their private prayer time.

The February prayer is on the outside cover of the Tower and was written by one of Trinity's members who prays faithfully for our Church. Please cut it out and use it in your prayer time this month. All of heaven rejoices to hear the people of God praying together for the Church.

As part of our Jubilee Year, we are looking for ways that more and more people can grow in their prayer life. Here are some ideas that you can consider for yourself:

\*As you pray this month, remind yourself that God is with you, always and everywhere. Invite God to open your heart, your mind, and your soul to a growing awareness of the Holy Spirit's action in your life and the lives of those around you. Be ready to be amazed as you start to notice and claim God's presence in new and wonderful ways.

\*Do you like to write? Would you consider writing a prayer for the church? If words are your special friends, so to speak, go ahead and compose a prayer and drop it off in the office or e-mail to [pastorimtrinity@gmail.com](mailto:pastorimtrinity@gmail.com). You don't even have to sign your name if you don't want to. Your prayer contribution might be just the thing for our Prayer of the Month! At the end of 2018, we'll see about putting together a Jubilee Year Prayer book!

\*Give the Wednesday night Prayer Meeting a try. It's a mid-week half-hour of prayer that moves smoothly from Prayers of Thanksgiving to a Psalm Prayer, a Prayer of Confession, and Prayers for the World. Everyone is welcome, and many people find it the perfect place to slow down, feel the presence of God, and get a few things off their chest!

\*Have you ever considered getting or being a prayer partner? A big part of my sense of ministry is what I call the 'Yenta' factor. A Yenta is a Jewish woman who served as the Matchmaker back in the day when arranged marriages were a common practice. I see the Yenta role as my chance to bring together people with similar interests, challenges, visions. So if you would like to have a prayer partner as part of our Jubilee year celebration, please let me know, and I'll help you find one! A partner in prayer is someone that you can talk to about your prayer life. You can pray together if that feels right or just support and encourage each other to greater faithfulness in the practice of prayer.

God's peace to us all as we remember the goodness of God who intends for us to rest in the Word, relax in Sabbath peace, and be renewed by prayer through the power of the Holy Spirit. In the name of Jesus,

## ‘The Joyful Journey’—from our Bishop

As I write this, the office is officially closed, but I am here finishing up some of the work that I want to get done before the New Year begins. In the quiet, I pause for a few moments, tracing the path on my desktop labyrinth. I take time to reflect, the peacefulness feeling a bit like the quiet at the center of a storm. 2017 has been quite a year, a whirlwind in so many ways. It has been my first full year as your bishop. I presided at my first annual conference with you, ordained and commissioned the first persons I will ever ordain or commission. I preached at licensing school graduation. I worked with others to make staffing decisions, decisions that challenged me not because we lacked good candidates but because we are blessed with so many good leaders, and not all could be offered the positions being considered. I have met with committees, groups, and design teams. I have preached at churches across the state, spoken to groups of clergy and laity in locations far and near, celebrated with you, pondered, and prayed with you. It has been a whirlwind, and I am grateful for every moment. I have experienced this whirlwind often as the creative winds of the Spirit. I also appreciate moments such as these of finding the quiet center, also a gift of the Spirit.

In this moment of reflection, I think of words that crossed my desk earlier in the week. *Love is the soul of leadership. Love is what sustains people along the arduous journey to the summit of any mountain. Love is the source of the leader's courage. Leaders are in love: in love with leading, in love with their organization's products and services, and in love with people.* (James Kouzes and Barry Posner, *The Truth About Leadership*, 138-139) This past year has been a year of deepening love – love for the Michigan Area, our churches, and our people; love for our identified vision as a conference: to be Christ-centered, engaging in mission and ministry, developing and encouraging bold and effective leaders, and nurturing and growing vibrant congregations. I love that our vision serves an even larger vision, the vision God has for a newer world.

God's creating, redeeming, and sustaining work, as we understand it in Jesus Christ, is the transformation of human lives and the world in love. The Psalmist glimpsed this newer world when he wrote, "Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other" (Psalm 85:10). The word for righteousness includes, and could even be translated, "justice," and the word translated "peace" is "shalom," that wonderfully encompassing word with its deep echoes of well-being, joy, and delight. John Wesley glimpsed this newer world in his sermon "Scriptural Christianity." What will the world look like when God's transformative work is complete? *All is peace.... Here is no din of arms... wars are ceased from the earth... Civil discord is at an end*

*forever.... Here is no oppression... no extortion to grind the face of the poor; no robbery or wrong... or injustice.... No unkind word can ever be heard among them, no strife of tongues, no contention of any kind.*

Such a world seems so distant, yet in God's grace we in our work contribute to this newer world. The theologian Nicholas Wolterstorff put it beautifully: *In the eschatological image of the city, we have the assurance that our efforts to make these present cities of ours humane places in which to live – efforts which are so often frustrated, efforts which so often lead to despair – will, by way of the mysterious patterns of history, eventually provide tiles and timbers for a city of delight.* (Until Justice and Peace Embrace, 140) What we are about together here in the Michigan Area is this transforming work of God, this work of new lives and a new world. It is the work of love, and I love it, and I am privileged to do it with people I love.

Thank you for the year gone by. Thank you for the work ahead.

## **Bay Cliff Health Camp is the Mission of the Month** By Nathan Ruble

The Mission of the Month for February is Bay Cliff Health Camp in Big Bay, Michigan. Bay Cliff is a world for special children between the ages of three and 18, and there you'll find children laughing and playing, while facing life with wheelchairs, leg braces, and hearing aids. You'll find children with cardiac problems, diabetes, speech and hearing deficiencies, and other handicaps.

Since its beginning in 1933, Bay Cliff Health Camp has promoted the health, welfare, happiness, and development of the children in the Upper Peninsula.

All children receive daily therapy while participating in a variety of outdoor activities. Their special needs are met through programs approved by their doctors. These include reading; swimming; and speech, physical, and occupational therapy. College students from around the U.S., as well as other countries, seek employment at the camp to find practical application for the things they have learned in the classroom. And now Bay Cliff has expanded its capabilities for year-round use.

People of the Upper Peninsula continue to make certain that the Bay Cliff tradition lives on. Funding efforts continue throughout the year, from the annual Fourth of July Polka Fest in Ontonagon to the Business and Professional Women's Club auction at Sault Ste. Marie. The Menominee Kiwanis Club holds a “Run for Bay Cliff.” Other communities hold dances, bake sales, and fairs. Donations come from corporations, trade unions, college fraternities, and private citizens.

Again this year, we would like to join in to help support Bay Cliff Health Camp. Thank you for your support.

## **Minutes of the Church Council Meeting, January 15, 2018**

Roll Call: Adam Ryan, Jack Noyce, Kristy Ryan, Cindi Strehlow, Emily Ritsema, Scott Ritsema, Pastor Geri, John Erickson, and Lea Varda.

The agenda was reviewed and accepted as presented. The December minutes were reviewed. A correction was made: **Apportionments have been paid in full for many years.**

Pastor Geri shared a report from the Conference about the Vital Church Initiative. Trinity completed Phase 1, engaged in conversation about Phase 2, and it was decided Trinity was not ready to pursue Phase 2 at this time. Naomi and Gary from the Conference, as well as District Superintendent Scott Harmon agreed with us. The Conference still wants to help Trinity out. In addition to our church taking up reading the Bible in a year, there are a couple of workshops around building healthy congregations. The Staff Parish Relations Committee will be looking into the information and promoting this. The Council agreed that the workshop was a good idea. As far as we know now, it is being offered at no charge to Trinity. It was generally agreed that September would be better than any time during the summer.

Pastor ended the moments of Silent Prayer time with the January Jubilee prayer.

### **NURTURE**

**Staff Parish Relations Committee – Scott made a motion on behalf of the Staff Parish Relations Committee giving the committee the authority to initiate Town Hall meetings to the church to maintain transparency of budgetary and finance issues. Jack seconded. Motion passed.**

### **OUTREACH**

**Feeding America Truck – Adam made a motion on behalf of Chris Langer for the TUMC to host and participate in the Feeding America Truck deliveries in June and August under the direction of Chris Langer, utilizing the grant money in the Feeding America Fund. Cindi seconded. Motion passed. Leadership Development and Resourcing Reports**

**Finance** – Jack reported the General Fund balance at the end of December was \$5,133.43. The revolving line of credit loan balance is paid off in full. We have been blessed with gifts, funds, and hard work from the Stewardship and Generosity Team, with the fellowships and fundraisers. Financial Secretary Cole Grenier has been asked by the Finance Committee to gather information from pledging and offering envelopes for the 2017 end-of-year reports. The 2018 Budget Worksheet was handed out and reviewed. There are discussions of a Financial Security Project to build a

prudent reserve for the fluctuations in giving, and holding it in a specific account.

### **The Budget Task Force Recommendations were reviewed and discussed by the following Committee representatives:**

**Finance Committee:** They have reviewed giving patterns in order to set revenue expectations at a more realistic level, based on past experience. The 2018 Budget reflects the insights gained from that review. They will continue to discuss the best way to communicate with the members of the church i.e. cover memo for the year-end statements.

**Trustees:** The Budget Task Force Committee has recommended to the Trustees that we do some of the following to curtail expenses or bring in more income: Encourage rental of the church facilities. At their suggestion, the Trustees are in the process of making a “rental” chart: we currently have only suggested charges for weddings, but will work on other charges, but it should be noted that Trinity is already used by groups that contribute financially. The following list is for the year 2017. A.A. \$390, O.A. \$160, Bridge Club \$548, Exercise Class \$1,031, Recitals \$150. As you can see, this amounts to \$2,279, which is a nice added income. The grocery slips that Betsy Trumbell keeps track of also bring in a large amount, so we should continue to let our people know that this is a good thing to do. I believe these slips brought in almost \$1,000 last year. Betsy can give the exact amount if you want it.

**Worship Team:** They do not see a need to limit themselves to one worship service at this time. They are looking at other ways to streamline and reduce costs.

**Staff Parish Relations Committee:** Discussions and results of the Budget Task Force items for Staff Parish – More research will be gathered and future consideration for job/duty sharing responsibilities with other local churches and determine possible savings from sharing resources with the Episcopal Church. Pastor’s compensation will be reviewed prior to the 2018 Charge Conference. No change to custodian salary/hours, but research and discussion with Larry on clarification of duties, hours, and subsequent job description updates. Discussion has taken place and an SPRC discussion and motion to remove the summer music duty from the music director’s job description, and subsequently the salary during the summer months, will take place at the February 5 SPRC meeting. The Council and Finance Committee will be advised immediately after. No change to the secretary hours. Further research on potential duty changes and budget savings regarding secretary “time sharing” with other local churches. Urgency around the need for Town Hall meetings to

inform the membership of what steps may be necessary if budgetary challenges are not resolved.

Bruce made a motion to adjourn, John seconded.

Meeting adjourned.

### **Minutes of the Trustees Meeting, January 8, 2018**

Present: Blair Daugherty, Marsha Bonicatto, Jerry Hicks, John Erickson, Brad Strehlow, Jon Harry, Betsy Trumbell, Pastor Geri Hamlen.

Blair called the meeting to order.

The Trustees' new member, Jerry Hicks, was introduced.

Betsy opened with a prayer.

The agenda was reviewed.

Marsha moved to accept the minutes from the December 11, 2017 meeting. Jon supported. Motion carried.

Marsha informed the Trustees that Rick Thompson had surgery for skin cancer. Betsy will send Rick a card.

### **COMMUNICATIONS**

The City of Iron Mountain sent a letter asking that we run water until we hear otherwise. The water is running in the utility room.

MDOT sent a letter asking permission to do sidewalk work by the Church. Blair will sign the OK and send it to MDOT.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

The three items from the Budget Task Force were discussed.

1. Church rental. We already get money from AA, the exercise group, the bridge club, weddings, funerals, baby showers, music recitals, etc. Betsy will check with Sally and Jack Noyce to see what was brought in from these groups in 2017. Jerry, Marsha, and Betsy will work on a charge schedule for use of the Church.

2. Change Trustee participation to overages in line items for maintenance and repair to \$18,000. **Marsha moved to take the message to Finance that the Trustees will keep our commitment at overages above \$20,000, not \$18,000. Jon supported. Motion carried.**

3. Get quotes for building and liability insurance. Trustees will look at this in the spring when our current policy comes due.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

D & L put a new ignition system in boiler #1. They will come back this week and put a new board in boiler #3.

The kitchen freezer doesn't work. Chris Langer sent information on walk-in freezers available for purchase from Feeding America. The consensus was that we do not need or have room for a walk in freezer. A new replacement freezer like the one we have would cost \$3,900.

John checked into repairing our current freezer with Jeff Helgren from Superior Heating and Refrigeration, with the cost of installing a new compressor being about \$1,200. **Jon moved to have the freezer repaired with Jeff Helgren, not to exceed \$1,500. John supported. Motion carried.**

Brad fixed the leaking sink in the kitchen. The parts were less than \$100.

Half of the automatic door doesn't work. Brad looked at it and can replace some parts to fix the door. **John moved to have Brad repair the door, allowing for purchase of parts not to exceed \$200. Marsha supported. Motion carried.**

John moved to accept these candidates. Brad supported. Motion carried.

Dawn Riutta found a stained glass and brass cross in a closet and wondered whether it could be restored and used. It needs new wiring and cleaning and maybe a new stand. Blair took it home to see if it can be restored.

Jon passed out a TUMC Maintenance Schedule for the Church and Parsonage that John and he had worked on. Jon will e-mail a copy to Dean Laitinen from Staff Parish and Sally and the Pastor. The Trustees will discuss this at the next meeting.

Trustees had discussed sandblasting and painting of the heater covers in the Church. Brad will get a quote from Adam Smart. We will also get a quote from Zams.

### **PASTOR'S TIME**

The brass on the advent wreath needs to be cleaned. Marsha will take care of this.

Pastor Geri talked about the Jubilee Year at Trinity. The prayer of the month was distributed.

Pastor Geri gave a closing prayer.

John moved to adjourn. Jerry supported. Motion carried.
